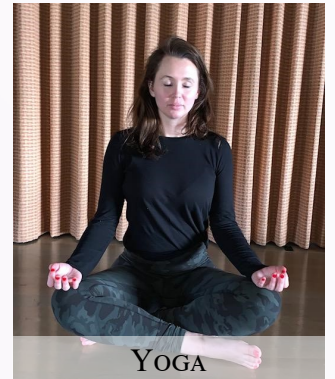

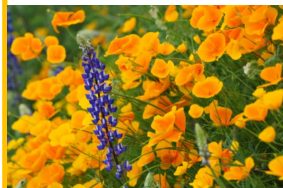

2019 Wildflower Show



Friday April 19 to Sunday April 21 — 10 am to 5 pm
Pacific Grove Museum of Natural History, 165 Forest Avenue, Pacific Grove

The 58th Annual Wildflower Show, the largest collection of wildflowers under one roof in the Northern and Western Hemispheres, is a spectacular show, with nearly 700 specimens on display. The good rainfall we have had this year should lead to a great display.

Members of the California Native Plant Society (CNPS) will be available during the show to identify plants or (hopefully) photos of plants for the public, and Bruce Cowen will lead tours of the Museum's native plant garden.

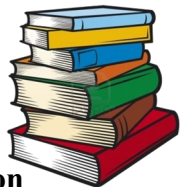

Ann and John Mahoney

Her smile would “launch a thousand ships,” but it took him many years before he ever saw it. It wasn’t until 1985 that John Mahoney met that radiant smile, when he was introduced to Ann Peterson. John’s secretary, Suzanne,

thought Ann, who was a real estate broker in Monterey, should meet John. Suzanne had it all planned out, but the introduction was brief - not futile, though. John must have seen the light, because a few days later, he did make a “cold call,” which resulted in three weeks trading phone calls and then, finally, a drink together at Gallatin’s. They have now spent 35 years together. When they married 30 years ago, they melded two families. John had two boys, and Ann had a girl and a boy. The children’s ages ran from 11-21, so to get them to know each other, John took them all to Mazatlán. That was the beginning of their lives together. But, this story starts long before.

Ann Ordway was born in Portsmouth, New Hampshire, but was brought up in adjacent Maine. The Ordways had a small hill in their back yard, and little Ann learned to ski on that hill at age three. She became so good, she was on the US Junior Alpine Ski Team. It was a natural for her, as hers was a skiing family - patrolling, instructors, etc. Her last two years of high school were spent at the Gould Academy, where she trained with the boys’ ski team. She graduated from Wellesley with a BS in Political Science. She then got married and moved to California, where her husband was at Stanford for his second year of business school. They lived on campus until moves to Athens, Georgia, the Philippines, and, in 1971, to Pacific Grove. During this time, Ann got her Master’s in Education, thinking she wanted to be a

teacher, but instead she worked at Del Monte Realty from 1979-1989. The marriage ended in 1983. John’s beginning was at Alta Bates Hospital, in Berkeley. His parents divorced, and John went to live with his father in Petaluma. And, guess what? We do have another resident who rode a horse to school! This is exactly what John did when he was in the 4th, 5th and 6th grades. After getting his BS in Business Administration at UC Berkeley, he worked in sales and marketing for US Steel, in San Francisco and St. Louis. He then came back to San Francisco to join Grubb & Ellis in real estate. Later, he was sales manager in Los Angeles.

Wanting his independence, he moved to Monterey in 1975 to start Mahoney & Associates. His family, too, dissolved, so it was then that John moved to Quail. It was from Quail that he and Ann moved here to the Manor in March. They are both now retired, though John still keeps his fingers in the business. He is also in his 9th year as Trustee of Montage Health, where he served on the board in 2016 and 2017.

Besides real estate, Ann has been active in the area since working on the first election campaign for Leon Panetta. She was Chairman of the Big Sur Land Trust, and when she was President of the Quail Homeowners, she was the driving force to see to it that a dog park not be allowed across from Quail Lodge.

The two of them don’t let any grass grow under their feet. They travel once a year to Zihuantanejo; have a cabin in the Santa Lucia Mountains, which they frequent often, ski; play lots of bridge and gin rummy; and now are trying to finish up their inspiring “redo” of the adobe cottage 34. John’s mother once said of John, “He is frequently wrong but never in doubt.” He was never in doubt, and certainly not wrong, when he saw that smile “that would launch a thousand ships.”
