
yond them, you look across the field for the redshouldered hawk sometimes perched in the cottonwood tree. He's there!

Why Carmel Valley Manor is Different

Surrounded by wooded hills with gardens and flowers galore, Carmel Valley Manor is a special place that feels like a wonderful little village. Nearby, Carmel and Monterey draw visitors to enjoy the many attractions and temperate year-round climate. In addition to our independent living campus, we have a wonderful assisted living center and an excellent skilled nursing facility, but all that doesn't begin to tell the story of what makes the Manor unique.

My wife wanted to move to a retirement community while we were still healthy. We felt it would be the greatest gift we could give our children, and she was right, as usual. Having compared a half dozen continuing care retirement communities (CCRCs) in northern California, we found the Manor had a certain vibrancy and vitality we didn't experience elsewhere. After we moved in, we felt that special quality grow over the months, until we realized we had become part of a *family*. True friendships grow from doing things with others that you all enjoy. And the *culture* that we became part of resulted in friendships that grew and matured. It happened when we began participating in the many activities at the Manor, which allowed those friendships to form, shaping our experience and making this a truly wonderful home.

What makes the Manor different from other

similar places? Our campus feels more like a residential village than an institution. We are blessed with being a small enough community (170 residents living independently) that everyone knows everyone else. We treat each other with respect and compassion. Residents are actively involved in shaping their Manor experience. A key component is participation by all the residents in the activities, which draws people together and creates friendships. For example, our kitchen staff creates tasty, healthy meals for us from scratch, but the residents also have input. Another example, favorite resident recipes are often on the menu, adding a personal touch to the variety. For years, we sometimes asked ourselves with a smile, "When is this cruise going to end?"

Residents also participate in the screening and evaluation of potential new residents. This helps ensure we are a diverse but compatible group of ladies and gentlemen. We have an active Residents' Council, but are different from other CCRCs in that we have no Activities Director. We, the residents, select, organize, and finance our own program of activities. Participating in the active life at the Manor is a key component in creating the magic that makes life here a satisfying and fulfilling experience.


