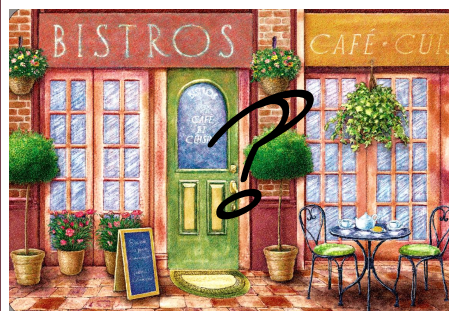


Bistro Mystro

as a possible new home for us, there was the Weaving Room right in the center of the main building, looking very mysterious and inviting. Each time we visited, that lovely living museum would send a siren call to me, and I knew I had to learn to weave!

Luckily for me, Marie Stanley was ready and eager to teach a new student. So it is that I have learned to weave from Marie, just as Marie herself learned to weave when she moved in many years ago -- taught by the legendary Joni Clayton. Marie tells me that when she began learning to weave, there were no other active weavers here, but 4 lovely looms and lots of yarn of all types and colors. Marie was simply drawn to the looms and the craft and art of weaving, and has loved weaving ever since.



Marie says, "I liked the whole process right from the beginning." The secret, according to Marie, is patience and care, as in any

other demanding and beautiful craft or art. I have learned a lot about patience and care! As you weave, you see wonderful colors, patterns, and textures grow. And now I see others also caught by the weaving room's call, and hope to help them discover the wonders of weaving.

Take a path through the Manor looking for Wearable Art:

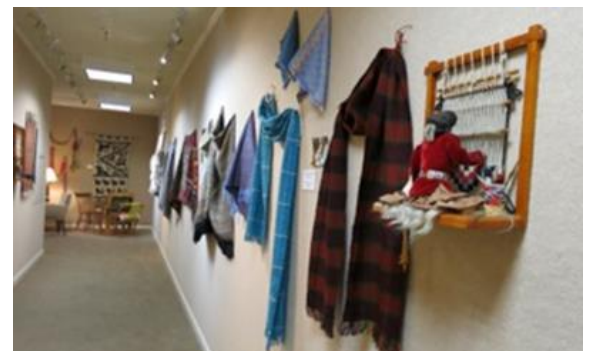
- Start with a look at the weaving exhibit in our own Hallway Exhibit.

Marilyn was his neighbor there, and they knew each other in high school. Blair went off to Stanford; Marilyn tried Mills. Although she loved Mills, she soon transferred to Stanford to be nearer Blair. As soon as he graduated, Blair joined the Marines. During World War II, Blair spent 26 months in the South Pacific. He participated in the landings on Bougainville, Guam, and Iwo Jima. He was awarded

two bronze stars and retired as a Lt. Col. Ten days after he returned from the war he married Marilyn.

Blair spent most of his career with Atlantic Richfield in the corporate office in Los Angeles, CA. He was on several volunteer boards including Friends of the LA School District. He was president of the ARCO Retirees Club of LA and was cited by the National Council on Ageing for his work. Blair still plays tennis regularly at CVAC.

Marilyn graduated from Stanford with a BA in Philosophy and Economics. She was a member of the Huntington Hospital Auxiliary and the Pasadena Assistance League. She later returned to school and received a teaching credential. She taught elementary school in Pasadena for twenty years. She played tennis and golf in her spare time. She loves reading and gardening.

The Hydex have two sons and four grandchildren and one great-granddaughter. One son lives in Salinas and the other in Hawaii. And of course, there is Benji, their black cocker spaniel.

Computer things:

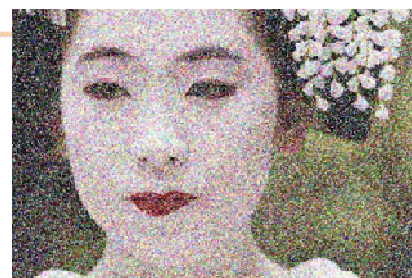
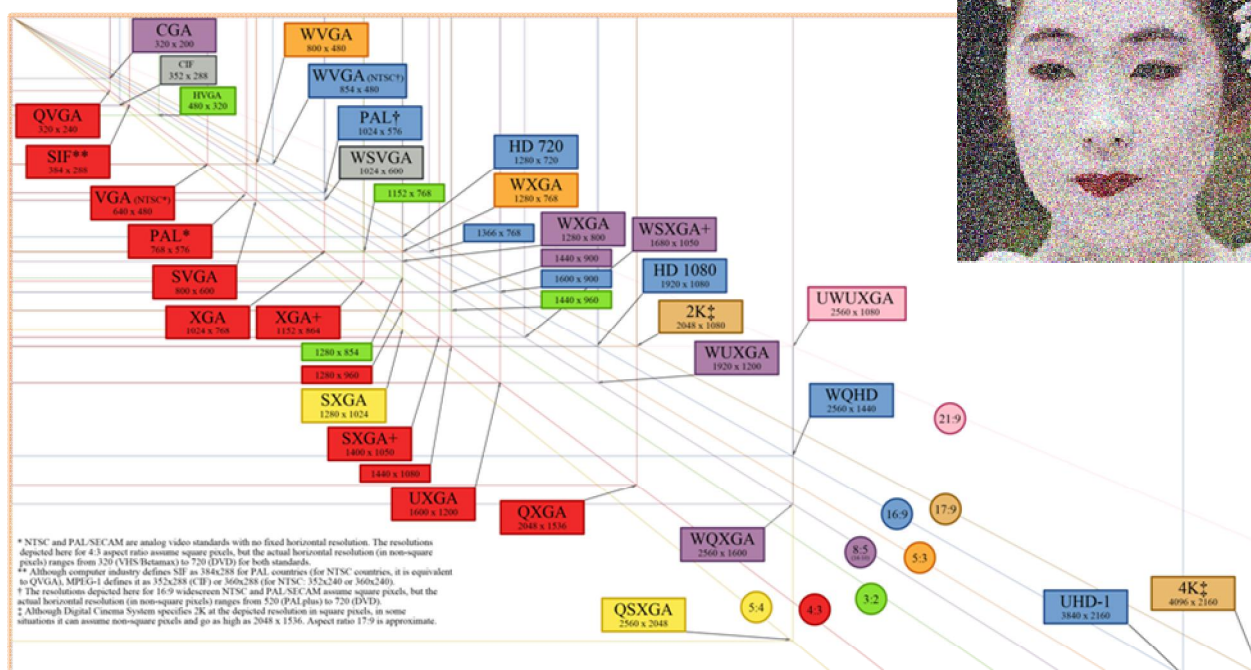


We've talked about the phenomenal growth in computer power, and the increases in the size of the pipes, the bandwidth, that provides world-wide connectivity, but what about the content? In the earliest days we just saw the line of type emerging on the screen. We've moved thru the stage where we got a page or a few pages at a time. The internet search function brought us a few pages with a picture or two and an email message from the kids. Now we are seeing web pages with a lot of text, many pictures and video, with links to the shopping mall, the book store, music store, streaming mov-

ies, world-wide news, ride sharing, and couch surfing.

PIXELS are an important way to understand the increase in content. Pixels are the smallest physical point, or addressable element, in a video display (PC monitor or TV set). This chart displays the progression of standard display resolutions from 1981 to the present - CGA at the top is 320x200 pixels per square inch (64,000), and 4K at the bottom is 4096x2160 pixels (8,847,360). (8K) (33,177,000) is about to come on the market.
