When I met Elly she was such an American girl that she would not even speak German with me, when I said “Guten Abend”, she said, “Good Night”. She did loosen up on Christmas songs!

Recently Elly had to make the decision to live at the Health Center. It happened quickly and there was no time for transition in Hillcrest. She called her younger sister and brother-in-law in the Los Angeles area to come up

and collect some “stuff”. They were determined that their house was already too full and they could not use more. She tried professional help and found it less than satisfactory. Remember downsizing to come here? Try that from a Health Center room! However, help was at hand.

Elly generously decided that she would give her worldly goods and possessions to the Manor, totally. In came good friends Betty Hughes and Bob Byers to help carry things that Elly wanted in her room. Then the movement grew. Friends helped gather up items for the R.O.S.E. Her furniture went to the downstairs annex of the R.O.S.E. with a few exceptions. You may have noticed the two new chairs in the telephone area of the coatroom and the stunning painting on the wall between them. You can’t miss the new décor. Betty Hughes organized the team of residents who helped and the job was rapidly accomplished.

Many hands made light work of some pretty hefty stuff with the help of our multi-talented caretakers as well. 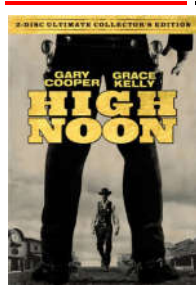

Ruth Rosen is an accomplished violinist and her delight in stringed instruments carries over into her paintings. It is as though she had to find a means of expressing, in a more lasting medium, the joy she feels in performing. She makes music with paint. The stringed music ensemble that she presents appears to be there ready to play for each of us as we pass in the CVM Gallery. There is more to her portrayal of musicians than just one viewpoint. Her beloved stringed instruments and their undoubtedly talented owners are there as a string band; a lively set of down-home players producing music often thought of as Appalachian or even Hill Billy. Ruth becomes a “fiddler” in that band. There is no singular emphasis on one musical form, classical or country, Ruth loves it all and it shows. What a blast!

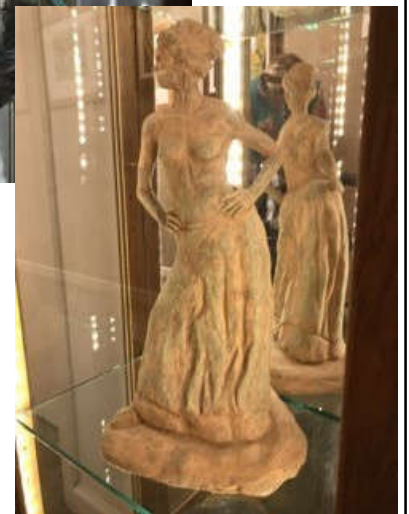
The Rosen talents are not limited to musical portrayal. Particularly noteworthy are the extremely dramatic paintings of flowers on a black ground and cats curled





has to be expression in several dimensions and often, in the Greek manner, seeks perfection. I believe it was Aristotle who criticized it as the lowest form of art as it was too close to mere reality! However, it may be the toughest to do since reality is familiar to everyone. Consequently, most of us truly appreciate the many visual aspects of sculpture and we are rather fond of the achievement of reality!

Larry works in the Greek and Roman manner, seeking to portray a well aligned body. With modern touches he manages to offer personality, grace in the figures and unexpected strength. Personality comes through. Larry shows us an interest in his characters and goes beyond the classic, cool ideal portrayal. These are real people. The mirrored case provides an opportunity for a couple of perspectives and the different aspects become apparent. The female figure sways her hip, the one I call the "Marlboro Man" or simply "cowboy" projects nonchalance, and the bass player seems ready to tune up and play. Larry, did you name them?



Go to the showcase and notice the many facets of the figures that must be considered. As a sculptor Larry Rosen demonstrates strong visual-spatial ability. Keep going Larry.
