

That was a song by The Safaris.... But we, at Carmel Valley Manor, have a new meaning when it comes to wipes. Since we have a septic system, the waste material needs to be pumped out on a regular basis. These disposable wipes, as well as the so called "flushable" wipes CANNOT be disposed of in our plumbing EVER. Other items which may be labeled as flushable are not. These items include: baby wipes, cleaning


and disinfecting wipes, facial towelettes, polishing wipes, rags, paper towels, hygiene products (incontinence pads) and even dental floss. These items can catch on irregularities or on the build-up in our pipes, causing clogs. In addition, the problem is compounded when thirsty plant roots look for water in the pipes. Their roots create a clog forming network. When the pipes to septic tanks don't flow, they can back up in your home causing many problems and much costly damage. Speaking of cost, just in the month of November, more than \$1500.00 was spent clearing these clogs. So, you can see why it is important to place all of these wipes, pads, or anything other than toilet paper in a trash can which you may keep near your toileting area. If you line the trash can with a plastic bag, disposal can be easy and sanitary.


Sent by Palo Alto Church,

UPLIFTED BY PEOPLE LOVING US.




