### Duplicate Bridge Myth Number One

There are several myths concerning Duplicate Bridge which deserve repudiation but this has to be number one. It is usually expounded in this fashion "The trouble with duplicate is that you have to know all those conventions." No you do not; but let us try to define what a convention is as a first step.

Bridge is a partnership game. It has this in common with Doubles at Tennis. Tennis players need to agree before they even reach the court who is going to guard the net and who will work the service.

They need a clear partnership agreement on this to play their best game. Similarly, in Duplicate, we need an understanding with partner if we are to paly a good game.

A convention is an item in our understanding and many of the popular bidding conventions are named after their inventor such as Blackwood or Drury. The one used here as an example was actually invented by George Rapee but it was popularized by Sam Stayman in 1945 and his name stuck to it. The Stayman Convention is very popular. It goes like this "Partner, you opened the bidding with One No Trump and I am bidding Tow

Clubs not necessarily because I have Clubs but to ask you to bid a major suit of 4 or more cards if you have one. If you don't have one please bid Tow Diamonds."

This is a convention that can often lead to a better contract but, to repeat the earlier remark you do not need it to play Duplicate Bridge. There is nothing in the Laws of the game which say you must use conventions. On the other hand you cannot expect to win many duplicate games without one or two.

We are so fortunate at the Manor to have a resident expert and charming teacher of Contract Bridge. Did you know that the American Bridge teacher Association rated her an finalist in a recent annual selection of the best teacher in the nation? Watch the notice board.

### **POOL LIFT DEMONSTRATION**



Mercedes Abluton, PT, demonstrated the new pool lift following the Water Exercise Class on May 3rd. Char Martin volunteered for the demonstration. The Chair lift system is designed to lift a person from the pool deck into the water (and back) and can be controlled by the person being assisted or by second person on the pool deck. Mercedes asked that person using the lift go through a brief orientation in how to safely use the new equipment. The lift is designed to lift persons weighing up to 300 pounds. We hope this will allow residents access to the pool that are not currently able to go down the pool ladders or steps.







### Music in the L<mark>i</mark>brary




