Valentine's Day is associated with the heart...and, as luck would have it, one of our residents is an expert on just that:

Progress in Cardiology

I began my medical education not too far removed from the "horse and buggy" doctor, an era full of dedicated physicians. Looking back, I'm amazed at the progress in the field of cardiology.

Diagnostics compared to today were archaic. CAT and MRI scans, sonar for seeking heart and circulatory disorders, and Isotope-tagged cells and other media for evaluating poorly functioning heart muscle were not in our armamentarium.

Therapeutics were markedly limited. In 1940 a risky surgical procedure to correct the congenital problem of "blue babies" was imaginative. The pump-oxygenator had not been invented. The research of Alfred Blalock, Vivien Thomas, and Helen Taussig, of Johns Hopkins, devised a shunt of the circulation to facilitate deoxygenated blood to circulate the lungs and become oxygenated. The procedure was experimentally per-

formed on dogs by Thomas and Blalock. Of interest was that Thomas, an African- American, could not afford a college education. The shameful expression of the "Jim Crow Law" would not even allow an African-American to enter the OR. It was only at Blalock's insistence that he was allowed to scrub.

Satisfactory treatment for acute heart failure was a void. Today, we can bail out the accumulation of fluid in the lungs in ten minutes using potent diuretics. Prevention of heart disease has improved with the elimination of risks (e.g., smoking, obesity, and hypertension), exercise regimes, and statin medication. The treatment of an acute "heart attack" is dramatic, with percutaneous angioplasty and stents or, if necessary bypass surgery. Angioplasties were started by a German cardiologist, Andreas Gruentzig. The first human angioplasty was performed in a San Francisco hospital by Gruentzig and Myler. The first

cardiac catheterization was by a German house physician, Werner Forssmann. With the aid of an RN girlfriend, tricked into assisting him catheterize his own heart. He was summarily discharged from the hospital. He did share a Nobel Prize and must have had a fixation on catheters, for he eventually became a urologist.

For dedication alone, a pioneer surgeon, Rene Favaloro, should be mentioned. A resident trainee from Argentina at the Cleveland Clinic, Favaloro was the first to use a vein bypass for coronary artery obstruction. He published extensively in the medical journals. In spite of a

promising surgical future in the US, he returned to his native country to do public health service. His political activity adverse to the ruling dictator probably led to an early death.

The frequency of heart transplants is only held back by the paucity of donors. Survivors of this surgery are now living beyond 20 years. Cardiac electrophysiologists outline aberrant electrical path-

ways and with radiofrequency ablation correct atrial fibrillation and other cardiac arrhythmias. Minimally invasive surgery is correcting valve defects. With the use of penicillin, rheumatic fever and the development of scarred valve leaflets is rarely seen except in third world countries.

The future promises advances in medical prescriptions geared to a patient's genetic makeup, thanks to Craig Venter's outline of the human genome. He now is mixing his avocation of sailing with his scientific drive, exploring the ocean's bioactivity. Those who have given up hope should step aside and watch the passing parade.

The New Year is a perfect time to check on topics that are important to your health and safety. Your clinic wants to ensure you will have a happy and safe 2017! Some of these items are as follows:



- Safety First! When you are walking, please wear light colored clothing AND to further protect yourself, wear a safety vest. This is especially important during this time of year, when days are shorter and there is not as much light. Vests are available at the Reception Desk.
- **Pet Care.** Plan ahead for your pet's care, so that in an emergency others will know who to contact and who will be caring for your little "family member." Posting the appropriate contact on your front door is helpful. In the event you are unable to make that call, someone else can make the contact for you.
- Medications. Bring any changes in your medications to the attention of the clinic. Now is a good time to go through your medicine cabinet and bring any expired medications to the clinic to be disposed of properly. DO NOT put them in the trash or flush them down the toilet.
- **P.O.L.S.T.** It's also time to recheck your choices on your P.O.L.S.T. form. Many things can affect past decisions, so take a look at your document to see if it reflects your current wishes.

Jean is currently hard at work on the photos she took in Antarctica. I'm sure they will be stunning.


