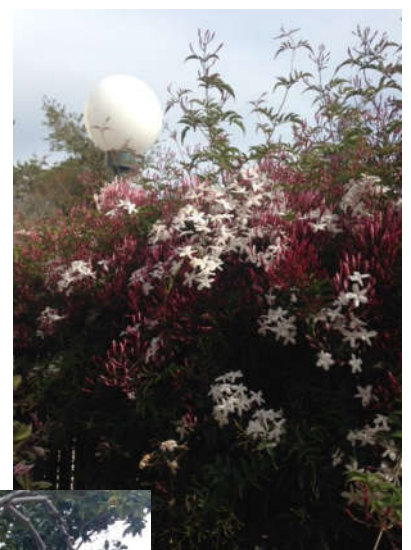
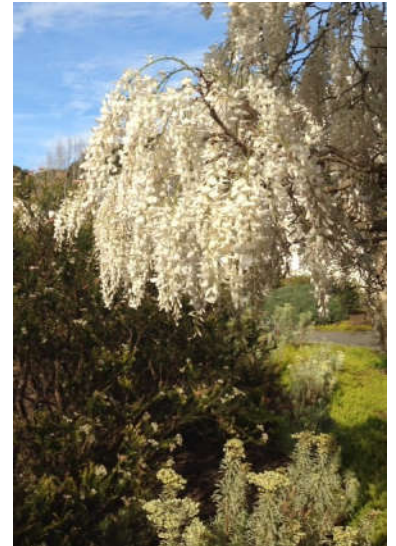
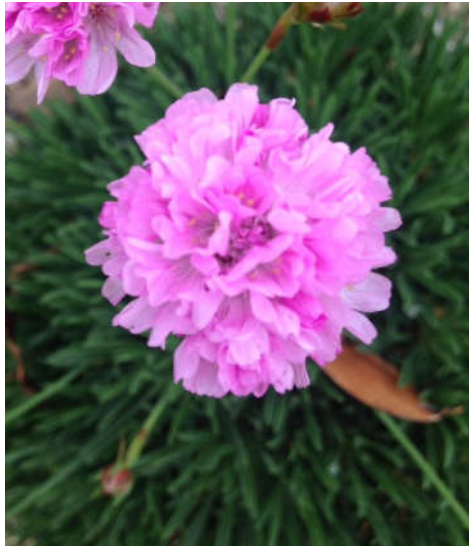
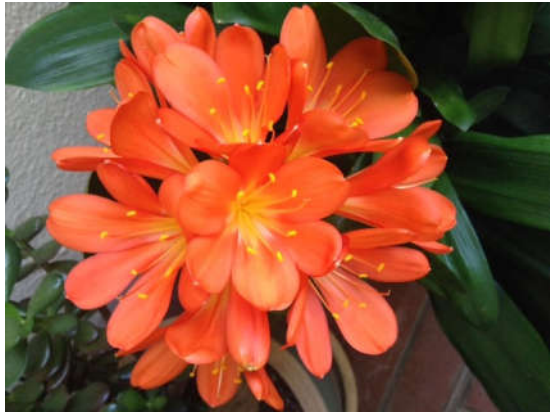


## Spring Has Come to the Manor

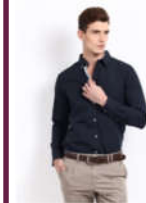
