Bastille Day is the common name given in Englishspeaking countries to the French National Day, which is celebrated on July 14 each year. In France, it is formally called la Fête nationale, The National Celebration. The French National Day commemorates the storming of the Bastille, on July 14, 1789, by angry Parisian crowds. This seismic act demonstrated that ordinary people would no longer accept the absolute power of the king and signaled the start of the French Revolution, which forced the creation of the modern French Republic. The July 14 Fête de la Fédération - which marked the first anniversary of the storming of the Bastille became a French national holiday in 1880 and has been observed ever since.

The Bastille was a fortress-prison in Paris which had often held people jailed on the basis of lettres de cachet

(literally "signet letters"), arbitrary royal indictments that could not be appealed and did not indicate the reason for the imprisonment. The Bastille held a large cache of ammunition and gunpowder, and was also known for holding political prisoners whose writings had displeased the royal government, and was thus a symbol of the absolutism of the monarchy. As it happened, at the time of the attack in July 1789 there were only seven inmates, none of great political significance.

The oldest and largest regular military parade in Europe is held on the morning of July 14, on the Champs-Élysées in Paris in front of the President of the Republic, along with other French officials and foreign guests. President Trump is expected to attend this year's parade to mark the 100th anniversary of the United States' entry into the First World War.

Our Manor Garden



Every garden loves a bit of decoration, and probably the first item would be a birdhouse. Sophia Gasser, a garden committee member, brought a blue birdhouse to the garden several years ago. It was rather odd-looking, made from 7 pieces of old used wood, painted several times, first white and then blue, now badly chipped. We put it in many places around the garden over the years, partly to hide it and partly depending on which flowers

were blooming where. There was a small round hole in the front, with a steeply slanted roof.

This year, to get it out of sight, we placed it high on the fence in the corner, under a tree limb near our dog park. One day while working near this area, I noticed a lot of little birds heading that way with great haste. Their little tails disappeared into the birdhouse door hole. They were bringing in things to build a nest. Several days later, there seemed to be a great disturbance in the trees. The little birds were crying out, for a jay

was hanging onto the front of the small house and trying to get inside. With all the noise the intruder flew away in terror. Then all was quiet for a time, and we worried that the chickadees had been frightened away. But we corded off the area and placed signs asking visitors not to disturb the wildlife nursery.

Some time later, activity began again, this time bringing in food. Then I saw something I had only read about, a bird flying away with something white on the end of his beak. Yes, it was Mr.B taking out the trash. This was the signal that all was well. This sequence of events could only be observed by accident, as we were there doing our garden work. Then all was quiet again, for they had fledged. But not far; they came in groups to help the young learn to fly and to hang upside down on our fence, using the pan of water set out for them. Soon we heard from high in the tree tops, where chickadees hang out, their chickadee-dee music.

But just to be sure all of the above really happened as it appeared, we opened the little blue house. It was clean and neat, so we put it back in place, ready for next year. Reading the instructions on how to build a birdhouse in the Audubon books, we learned that the odd little house had been made by carefully following the measurements required for attracting chickadees.

Just in time, Floyd and Barbara felt the plane settle heavily, the landing gear taking the plane almost to the end of the runway. On another flight, this time over Baja, they flew into unexpected cloud

cover and had to circle for some time before there was finally a break. "When we finally landed I was ready to kiss the tarmac," Barbara said. "I shed no tears when our flying era ended."
