Will Furman's World, an Abstract Angle on Community

Over the past weeks we have been treated to an exhibition of the work of Will Furman, a resident of Carmel Valley Manor.

Will is a professional photographer who has recently been honored by having his photographs placed in the California Central Library system in Sacramento. His photographic illustrations of the book about an old Western town, Bodie, have received accolades from many sources. The pictures that he has taken of the birds in the coastal reaches of Sanibel and Captiva Islands are outstanding, worthy of National Geographic recognition.

In this seemingly triple show, Will offers his viewpoints with regard to environment, the open sea air of the birds, the town center of the old West, and the slick glitz of the plate glass facades of shops and cafes on the city streets. We even see the monstrous trucks that keep business going. The rural images reveal evidence of human habitation with no people happily there. They bring with them a heavy dose of nostalgia. His work on the current scene shows us people living in the urban environment, aware of its advantages. Will explains his techniques of production, and we know he is playing with reality, the angles of view and our perception of the glassy reflection in the mind's eye. He lets us determine what it is all about. A work of abstraction! Keep your eye on Will's work and watch for future developments. They're coming.

YOUR HELP IS NEEDED!

During the past year, we residents have been privileged to participate in a vast variety of activities and programs for our entertainment, pleasure, education, and religious support (especially in Hillcrest and the Health Center). There is not a single resident who, in some way, does not benefit from these programs and activities supported by the Council Budget. In June of each year the Council requests that Manor residents contribute to the cost of running our committees and activities.

The Council budget for 2018 is \$65,402. This covers expenditures for the current year including our 55th Manor Anniversary Celebration in October. With our carryover of \$6,402 from 2017, and the generous support from the R.O.S.E., projected to be \$37,000 this year, the Council recommends a contribution of \$120 per resident (\$10.00/month) to support the Council's budget and activities. Every resident is encouraged to participate. Our average donation request over the last seven years has been \$139 (range \$75-\$180). We anticipate that some residents may not be able to provide full support, and we encourage those who can to contribute more.

It has been often said that we, the Carmel Valley Manor family, are unique among residential care facilities because of our self-directed programs of activities, activities which are created for areas of mutual interest, conducted by resident participation, and financed by resident contributions. Your contribution will ensure continuation of this fine tradition! A pledge form will be in your mail box. We appreciate your support.


