It's a win-win all the way around!!






"On The Good Ship, Lolli Pop....." sang Shirley Temple, so many, many years ago. And a few years back the Manor residents heard it again, on stage here, sung by one of our prolific playwrites. She wrote the play, directed and acted in it. Ideas for plays run about in her head, constantly, to this day.

Pat Hughes was born in Ridley Park, Pennsylvania to a family devoted to education. When she was about seven, the family moved to Puerto Rico where her father was head of the Department of Education. They lived there for three years, then moved when her father accepted the job of running the Department of Education in Maine. When it was time for college, Pat went to Penn State her time here she has written and directed at least sixteen plays. It usually was one a year and would have been more, as those ideas are always scurrying around in her head. A total of 36 people has been involved with the work of putting on a play over the years, many holding down a new character every single year!

Pat usually starts to create a story thinking about the characters of the people who live here at the Manor. She builds a play around those characters (who end up playing themselves without knowing it). She has done Christmas plays, murder mysteries, comedies and loved the fact that the actors always pulled something out of each character. She enjoyed hearing the sound of laughter

when it was time for co and earned her own Education degree. From that moment on her life was one of doing what she enjoyed most: involvement with children, teaching, writing plays, acting in Community Theaters, Summer Stock and all related things.

Loving all this herself, Pat wanted to involve her students in learning how to write, act; to learn all the aspects along the way. She taught third,

fourth and sixth grade students in New Hampshire and Pennsylvania. "I felt that these kids needed to read a book and then do a play." One of her sixth grade classes read Peter Pan, and then they helped her write the script. "Some of those kids ended up on Broadway" she said, proudly. Her influence on the children was fulfilling as they were so excited to learn how to write, produce, do scenery and all the things that go along with play writing, directing, etc.

After twelve years of teaching on the East Coast, Pat accepted a job teaching in Salinas in 1968. Here, again, she filled her students with the excitement of writing plays. In 2005 she moved to the Manor where the residents learned of her talents. Some of her plays were created during her month long sojourns to Alaska, and in her 9 year-old blind Greyhound she rescued when he was 2 ½. She watches the patio bird friends and looks forward to the occasional visit of our neighboring Cougar. Maybe Mr. or Ms. Cougar knows of Pat's talents and is hoping to be cast in one of her plays. Staff Spot-A brief profile of our staff


Chris Regan has been here at the Manor for over 18 years. She has a Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing, as well as in Public Health Nursing. She is a powerhouse of energy, a central engine of organization of the area's resources in nursing that affects our CV Manor. We all are grateful to be here at the Manor in this COVID era, safe and protected. But did you know how this has come about? Our Nursing Department is headed by Chris, who stays focused and aware, communicates in a way that gets responses, navigates inputs, knows the area

well. There are 16 skilled nursing communities on the Monterey Peninsula, all supportive of each other that Chris is involved with, as well as organizations, for example, MHOAC* which coordinates medical supplies if needed, and the Office of Emergency Services. The CA Dep't of Public Health is part of this network as is the Monterey County Health Dep't. In fact, we all can access the CA Dep't of Public Health for the latest precautions and latest figures on Covid deaths in the US –over half a million.

The Manor's Nursing Dep't has two RNs trained in Infection prevention who share one position. We have an Infectious Disease physician, who came

out of retirement from CHOMP and is available to us here, giving expert guidance, Dr. Geraldine Taplin. She was here for two days, navigating through CDC, etc. information, looked at our plan, and rearranged some of our emergency services. She was here this past Wednesday, March 3 as our liaison with the Health Dep't. There are also weekly Zoom meetings with all these entities that Chris is part of.

As Chris has a Nursing Health Administration license and a RCFE* certificate, she was able to arrange a partnership with CVS Pharmacy to be the Manor's supplier of Pfizer vaccines which made the Manor among the first in the area to deliver the vaccinations.



The process was started in September 2020, involving much documentation by Chris. We all know how incredibly smoothly this went. Just under 450 vaccinations were given here, under the direction of Chris.

Chris grew up in the hills of the Santa Ynez mountains on the Central CA coast. For respite from her hectic work here, she rides her horse and takes her two dogs, a golden retriever and a lab along for their exercise. She has ridden horses ever since she can remember. She says her connection with the out of doors gives her a "peaceful dimension in life". Here in the Carmel Valley she and her husband, Patrick to whom she has been married for

33 years have a home on the river. He is a biology and horticultural consultant, specifically regarding CA native plants, with the focus being drought tolerant and sustainable landscaping. Always thinking of crisis management, their home has a well and their back up should there be an electric outage is a generator. Prior to having the generator, they went to the river for their water when there was an outage. The generator runs on gas, so they need to have a source –all strategic planning. Chris and her husband have two children, Kate who has a degree in Parks and Recreation Administration and is now pursuing a Masters in agriculture education and teaches in high school in San Luis Obispo. Their

son Benjamin is a fire fighter and studying to be a paramedic. He and his wife live in the Santa Barbara area. He and Chris "talk shop", for example, intubating, needed for being a first responder. Another generation of helpers.

In the photo of Chris, her horse and the River, you can clearly see her every muscle relaxing. We all relax with her here at the Manor.
