I started my career as an abstract expressionist; somewhere along the way I found sculpting animals became more meaningful, so the cow sculptures are a part of that shift. They all began as an idea, then a plaster original which was taken to the foundry for the complicated process of molds and casting, then welding together the many parts, and finally the patina. Bronze sculptures take a long journey from start to finish, as you can see. I encourage everyone to get up close to the sculptures to look at and feel the surface textures--they can get lost when seen from the distance but are a nice part of the whole thing.

These cow sculptures were cast about 10 years ago from the same mold--they are identical except for the patina. Most sculptors make an edition of at least five pieces since the casting process is so expensive; in this case I kept three for myself. The slope in front of the Meeting House is perfect for these large scale sculptures--they become part of a larger picture, in this case the planting design that Gordon Dill has in mind. The overall effect will be perfect from every angle.

# **More on the Cows**



We asked Grounds Supervisor, Gordon Dill: "What is the reason for the cows, and what is the plan to go with them?" We didn't realize there had been so much planning for the new look. Bruce Newell, a creative resident sculptor of the cows, and Gordon made a landscaping plan with the cows in the background. It was to create a linear perspective in the wasteland space with the eye moving across a sea of color and texture to the cows (a great conversational piece) and then to the Meeting House. Bruce and Gordon took a survey and showed the idea and plan via a video to those who were interested; they took a vote afterwards, and the plan was accepted.

Concrete platforms were poured for the chatting cows to stand on. (Shall their names be Harvey, Hector, and Hank?) In two more weeks, the planting should be done surrounded by a mulch and bordered with Chinese pistachio trees which are trees that can handle the windy slope and which gophers don't like.

By the end of summer the old wasteland should be a sea glow of colors: pink, blue, white, red and gray, low to the ground, which is better for the sprinklers and will show a nice pattern. One could say that the cows have come to the Manor to graze, as those of us here have come to the Manor to graze while enjoying the bountiful colors everywhere.
