Memorial Day



General Jimmy Doolittle, December 14, 1896-September 27, 1993

Doolittle is the four-star general who received the Congressional Medal of Honor for leading the 1942 bombing mission over Tokyo. His 90th birthday was celebrated on television with the two-hour "All-Star Tribute to General Jimmy Doolittle." This special, produced by Hope Enterprises, was taped before a large uniformed audience to approximate the look of a Bob Hope USO Show.

Doolittle became one of the top air commanders of World War II, at various times heading the 12th, 15th, and 8th Air Forces. In a tribute on the show President Reagan praised Doolittle's "curiosity, courage, tenacity,

dedication, perseverance and not least of all, bravery-beyond the comprehension of those who remain on the ground." Reagan called Doolittle "a modern legend and my personal hero."

His responsibility was heavy and sometimes bore down heavily on Doolittle. In 1944 he wrote his wife: "I sometimes think that when this is all over I'd like to run a peanut stand. Would want it on a quiet street where there wouldn't be too many customers to interfere with my meditations. Actually, after a week's rest I imagine I'd be restless and looking for work and responsibility again."

General Doolittle and his wife, Josephine, lived at Carmel Valley Manor from 1978 to 1990. She died at the Manor in 1988, and he died at his son John's home in Pebble Beach in 1993.

WASTE SOLUTIONS

"Houston, we've had a problem here." So spoke Apollo 13 astronaut Jack Swigert when one of their oxygen tanks exploded during their mission to the moon, damaging the power supply.

Through quick thinking and excellent knowledge of the systems involved on the part of Glynn Lunney, a flight director at Mission Control, the crew was moved to the moon landing module with its own battery power.

The main capsule was shut down until reentry could be initiated and the now useless module was then ejected. Thus, three lives were saved through thorough knowledge and quick action.

It seems, however, that when the serious situation is not instantaneous but spread over a long period of time, the solution may also be delayed over a longer period of time... until the solution is urgently needed. The delay can be fatal. Such is likely the case with our glut of waste

materials from our everyday living. Since China is no longer purchasing our waste materials to recycle due to producing enough of their own to supply their needs, we have no alternative that is currently cost effective for numbers five through seven of the numbered recyclables. Almost everything you purchase these days is wrapped in some form of plastic, and once you buy it, the disposal is up to you. The manufacturer takes no responsibility for the disposal of their product or the

wrappings in which it came.

At the Manor, we use an inordinate number of plastic bags to line our waste baskets, garbage containers, sandwiches, cookies and bed linens which are one time use items. If compostable items are disposed of in plastic bags, are they compostable? Are there alternatives to non reusable plastic bags? The "Green Industries" have some solutions. Some plastic bags are available which are made exclusively from plant material, but they are more expensive than those that are made from oil. The upside is that they are compostable.

The time has come to stop the years of discussions on this subject and implement the reasonable solutions that are currently doable.

The more plastic that goes into our oceans, landfills, rivers, and groundwater, the greater the level of plastic material

that will go into the environment and gradually, as microplastics, into our own bodies.
