

Manor Forum on Monday September 20 at 10:30 am

Dr. John Arquilla speaking on "The New Challenge of Cyberwarfare"

"Individuals, institutions, and critical infrastructure remain very vulnerable to a range of types of cyberattacks, from personal identity and intellectual property theft, ransomware, and mass disruption of power grids and even military operations. To date, all efforts to mitigate these threats have failed. This talk explains why, and offers fresh insights for JOHN ARQUILLA SECURITY STRATEGY and policy."

Dr. John Arquilla is Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Defense Analysis at the United States Naval Postgraduate School. He is the author of over a dozen books covering a range of topics, from irregular warfare (e.g., Insurgents, Raiders, and Bandits, Rowman 2011; and Afghan Endgames, Georgetown 2012) to strategies for improving cybersecurity (Bitskrieg, Polity 2021). He has also undertaken an effort to cultivate design-oriented practices that are applicable to military and security affairs. His study of World War II (Why the Axis Lost, McFarland 2020) provides a fresh perspective on that greatpower conflict, reconsidering it from a design perspective. In terms of policy experience, Dr. Arquilla served as advisor to senior military and civilian leaders during Operation Desert Storm, as well as in the Kosovo War. He has also been involved in several post-9/11 matters, testified before Congress on countering terrorist networks, and served on a small team that worked for President Obama to help identify new directions for American defense.

TELEPHONE CALL IN 1974

"Hi, would you like to drive down to Carmel tomorrow? I'm taking my mother to visit a friend at Carmel Valley Manor."

"Sure, I've heard of Carmel Valley Manor but I've never seen it."

The next morning when my friend, Merre Jayne, drove us down from Palo Alto the day couldn't have been more beautiful. The hills were still green from the winter rains, and the ocean sparkled in the sunshine. Arriving at the Manor, I was impressed by the white buildings against the well-kept lawns. Once out of the car I saw the covered walkways with their gnarled Wisteria trunks holding up branches of sweet-smelling purple blossoms. The fragrance was everywhere. My father had a cousin who lived here. I had never met her, but she was the reason I had heard of the Manor. It turned out she lived in the same building as the woman we had come to see so we all had lunch together, and I was introduced to other residents. My husband had died the previous year, and I had had visions of myself being all alone for the next 40 years. I thought if that was to be my future what a nice place to be. Lunch wasn't what it is today, but it didn't matter. People were talking, laughing, and having a good time. Even though I knew I was way too young to be admitted I inquired at the desk about prices. At that time either a studio or a one bedroom unit [I forget which] had a \$27,000 entrance fee. By the time I moved in 17 years later I had remarried and the entrance fee had risen considerably but coming here was the best thing I could have done. If my husband and I had been living in an individual house when he died, I would have felt totally isolated which is unhealthy for anyone. Here if you want solitude all you have to do is close the door. Open it and you are with people you know and care

If my friend hadn't called that day so long ago I probably would never have seen the Manor and would have ended up living somewhere else. I have visited friends in other retirement homes and have never seen anything comparable to ours. The Manor is unique. We are lucky to be here.

WE WELCOME LESLIE FAASSE TO THE MANOR



She didn't purr for four months. She had been found in Soledad without a home. Never having been with people she was very shy. The S.P.C.A. was taking care of her on November, 2020

when a call came in: "I just lost my nineteen year old cat, and I want to adopt a female kitten." Off to the S. P. C. A. the caller went. She brought a two- year old cat she named Trixie to her home on Ridgeback Rd. in Carmel Valley. Trixie and Leslie have bonded together like adhesive tape.

Leslie Faasse has always been a cat lover even though she grew up with dogs. She was born Leslie Buchanan in Wichita, Kansas. (She sneaks a smile when she says, "a garden spot".) She grew up as a tom boy tumbling here and there with her three younger brothers; climbing trees, drinking from springs, and pushing cars up hills, when they would stall on the nearby hill. We won't see her around much, but with her good sense of humor she says, "There's nothing I have to do and I love that."
